Anaheim to Host National Athletic Directors Conference

INDIANAPOLIS, IN (December 10, 2013) — About 1,500 high school athletic directors will be attending the 44th annual National Athletic Directors Conference December 13-17 at the Anaheim Convention Center in Anaheim.

The largest gathering of high school athletic directors in the country is co-sponsored by the Indianapolis-based National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) and the National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (NIAAA).

Although a few NIAAA committees meet on Friday, December 13, the conference officially gets underway on Saturday, December 14, with registration at 9 a.m. and the Opening General Session at 5:30 p.m.

Bill Walton, who was one of the greatest high school and college basketball players of all time, will be the keynote speaker at the opening session. Walton set numerous records at La Mesa (California) Helix High School and was three-time Player of the Year at UCLA. He was inducted into the NFHS' National High School Hall of Fame in 1997 and was named one of the 50 Greatest NBA Players. Walton will speak on "Climbing Back to the Top of the Mountain – One More Time."

Some of the key topics to be discussed at the 42 scheduled workshops include Title IX compliance, adapted sports, use of social media, evaluating coaches, corporate sponsorships, emergency planning, sports specialization, communicating with parents, non-faculty coaches and booster clubs.

Pat Haden, University of Southern California (USC) athletic director, will be interviewed by NFHS Executive Director Bob Gardner during the Closing General Session at 1 p.m. on Tuesday, December 17.

Haden set numerous records as a football player at LaPuente (California) Bishop Amat High School and then led USC to three Rose Bowls and two national championships. He is a 1995 inductee into the National High School Hall of Fame.

Awards will be presented to 25 athletic directors during the five-day conference. Eight administrators will receive NFHS Citations at 12 p.m. Monday, December 16, during the conference luncheon.

Many of the athletic directors in attendance will be involved in NIAAA Leadership Training Institute classes. A total of 37 sessions of Leadership Training classes will be held providing numerous professional development opportunities.
