Phoenix to host 48th annual National Athletic Directors Conference

INDIANAPOLIS, IN (November 29, 2017) — The Phoenix (Arizona) Convention Center is slated to host more than 2,000 athletic administrators, spouses, guests and exhibitors who will converge on the "Valley of the Sun" December 8-12 for the 48th annual National Athletic Directors Conference (NADC).

The country's largest meeting of high school athletic directors is co-sponsored by the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) and the National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (NIAAA) of Indianapolis.

The first-ever NADC in Phoenix begins Friday, December 8, with several NIAAA committee meetings. The full conference begins at 9 a.m. on Saturday, December 9, with registration in the lower-level Exhibit Hall. The Opening General Session begins at 5:30 p.m. on Saturday.

John Croyle, the founder of Big Oak Ranch, Inc., serves as the opening session's keynote speaker. Croyle is a highly regarded professional speaker, and a former all-American football player under coach Paul "Bear" Bryant at the University of Alabama.

The Closing General Session at 1 p.m. on Tuesday, December 12, features keynote speaker Anthony Robles. Robles, a former member of the Arizona State University wrestling team, captured the 2011 NCAA individual wrestling championship in the 125-pound weight class despite being born with only one leg. His college wrestling career concluded with more than 100 victories and being recognized

as a three-time all-American. Robles also was the recipient of the Jimmy V Award of Perseverance at the ESPYs in 2011.

Workshop sessions for this year's NADC get underway at 8:45 a.m. on Sunday, December 10. Key topics for the 40 workshops include citizenship, hazing/bullying, multi-sport participation, issues with parents, social media, transgender policies, Title IX compliance and safety for afterschool activities.

In addition to networking opportunities, NIAAA Leadership Training Institute (LTI) courses will provide professional development opportunities for attendees. The first session of LTI classes begins at 10:30 a.m. on December 9, and the final session takes place at 11 a.m. on December 11.

Eight athletic directors will be recognized with NFHS Citations for their contributions to interscholastic athletics at the local, state and national levels. The Citation recipients will receive their awards Monday, December 11, during the Conference Luncheon.
