
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

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

MASTER OF THE PRESS: Salpointe's Ed Doherty

THE 1982 TITLE RACE: SALPOINTE'S LANCERS SHOULD WIN IT ALL!

TUCSON SALPOINTE . . If Vincent Price was the Master of the World, and Lon Chaney the . Master of Disguise, then Ed Doherty is definitely the Master of the Press. If Coach Doherty continues to convince the press that his teams each year are too small and too slow to compete in AAA competition, then he deserves another Emmy. He's already won two. Today they reside in the trophy case at St. Mary's High School in Phoenix. He almost landed another last December, but Coach Bill Mitton at Trevor Browne, also in Phoenix, stole all the thunder. Listen to what Doherty told the Southwest Sports News Service about his team last year: "The truth is that by every criteria by which a football squad is evaluated, this is the weakest squad in Salpointe's history." Prior to the 1981 football campaign, Salpointe received an early season ranking of No. 9 in the state, much to the dislike of Mr. Doherty, who then wrote: "Such blantant misrepresentation is unfair to our school, its team, and its coaches, and places undue pressure on our players. If this represents the level of your reporting expertise, please do not refer to Salpointe Catholic High School in any of your future publications." Nice try, Ed. Three months and one week later the Lancers entered the Class AAA title game in Tucson with an 11-2 record and a chance for Doherty to win his third state championship since joining the Arizona prep ranks in 1965. "Ed Doherty is a great high school coach," says a former assistant who asked to remain anonymous. "But one of the best things he had going for him at St. Mary's was his rapport with the press. He had them convinced we were terrible. And they believed it. When we won, he looked like a genius." This fall the Master of the Press should win his 100th high school game in Arizona. He is 91-31-3 in the Grand Canyon State. That's a .730 winning mark, one of the top 30 of all time in Arizona. However, his name doesn't appear on the charts in the latest edition of the Arizona High School Record Book - at Doherty's request. Dohertycoached high school teams have already won more than 100 games. But the 'ole fox's won-loss mark in the prep ranks in Massachusetts is unknown. If he knows it, he's kept it a secret. But Doherty's success in Arizona is no secret. The former college and professional assistant (head coach at both Arizona and Arizona State) arrived at St. Mary's in the fall of 1965. The Knights were down in the dumps. After one season they were 4-5-1 and on

their way out. Doherty's 1966 "midgets" finished 9-2 after Tucson High chopped them up 34-0 in the Class AAA semifinals at the University of Arizona. Then they went on a terror. Between 1967-69, Doherty's Knights logged a 35-2-0 mark, two state championships and one runnerup. With tiny (5-10, 205) fullback Tim Smith leading the charge, St. Mary's won all 13 games in 1967 after defeating high-powered Tucson Pueblo, 34-22 in the finals. The only low point in the 1968 campaign was the sudden death of assistant coach Tom Kelley before the season-opener with Tucson Salpointe. Salpointe prevailed 25-7, but the Knights regrouped and won 11 straight, including a 27-14 win over Douglas in the AAA title game at Phoenix College. The 1969 season ended with 20,800 spectators at Arizona State watching Phoenix Central snap a 22-game win streak, 14-7 in the AAA finals. The loss came just one week after an incredible

56-8 outburst against Tucson High in Tucson. In that game, sophomore quarterback Tom Baker passed for 239 yards and four touchdowns. Injuries plagued Doherty's Knights in 1970, his last in Phoenix, and the team finished 5-5. He then coached several seasons at Holy Cross before making Tucson his home. In 1977, Salpointe beckoned and Doherty was back in the prep ranks. It took him longer to reach the playoffs in Tucson than in the Skyline Division, but nevertheless he made it — in 1979 with a losing record: 4-5-2. In his first five seasons in Tucson, the Lancers recorded won-loss records of 6-4, 7-3, 4-5-2, 10-2 and 11-3. If Salpointe isn't in the



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
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playoffs this fall, something is wrong. From that 11-3 state finalist team, 29 holdovers out of 45 squad members return. Six were starters. Better yet, the Master of the Press returns three key performers, players a coach can build a title contender with: QB David Santa Cruz (5-10, 166), RB Joe Rowley (5-8, 160) and kicker Mike Sellin (5-9, 150), only a junior. Another honors candidate is DB Marc Flores (6-2, 165), a senior with 4.7 forty speed. Don't let their size fool you. Kicker Sellin was a member of the Tucson all-city team as a sophomore. He didn't get much practice in the state title game, a 20-0 Salpointe loss, but he did on the way. In Santa Cruz, Doherty has a signal caller with playoff experience, a plus for any coach. And in Rowley, Salpointe has one of the best all-around athletes in Tucson. He was the Lancers' leading ground gainer before a shoulder injury against Sunnyside shelved him for the remainder of the playoffs. He runs 40 yards in 4.5 seconds; and last spring he high jumped 6-6 and ran the 100 meters in 10.8. Unless they shrink in the offseason, at least half-a-dozen Lancers will tip the scales at 200-plus pounds. Still, Doherty won't give up. His comment about the 1981 season: "Surprising." His outlook for the upcoming 1982 campaign: "Bleak." Nice try, Ed.

The Lancers should win it all.

man returns 13 letterwinners from a team which lost 3-0 to Tucson Salpointe in the semis. Most importantly, QB John Brouse is back. The Rockets' field general completed more than 50 percent of his passes for 1,150 yards and 14 scores in 1981. College scouts are keeping a close eye on teammate Richard Bear (6-4, 240), one of just several "big men" in the Moon Valley attack. Junior Keith Politte (5-11, 235) gives the Rockets another good offensive tackle. Three quick skill players include WR Chris Washington (6-1, 175), and running backs Ron Walker (5-9, 160) and Vince Cavele (6-0, 170). The defense is also sound, led by tackle Ken Schiffbauer (5-11, 210) and DE Jeff Hungerford (6-1, 180). The Ortega brothers, Rick and Dick, are both 5-10, 285-pounders. Senior Barry Duncan may be the best kicker in the Skyline Division. The early schedule is murder. Moon Valley opens at home with Phoenix Maryvale, then meets Mesa Westwood before traveling to Tempe to play McClintock.

PHOENIX TREVOR BROWNE . . . More than 20 lettermen from last year's state championship club picked up their diplomas last spring. But shed no tears for the Bruins. Coach Bill Mitton is all smiles as he enters the 1982 campaign. Things are on a roll at Trevor Browne. In the past four years, the Bruins have finished 9-3, 10-2, 10-4 and 12-2. Last year they became the first team since Camelback in 1973-74 to play in back-to-back state title games. They may be back again. Like Moon Valley, TBHS returns its quarterback. The 6-2, 180-pound Jamie Meek threw for 700 yards in the Bruins' ground-oriented offense. His experience is a big plus. Mitton's forces totaled 3,842 yards on offense last fall and it all started with Meek. Others starters include defensive backs Kevin McKee (5-11, 170) and Jeff Sing (5-9, 160). The front wall will again be massive: OG Mike Baraban (6-0, 210), OG Robert Forney (5-10, 190), OT Keith Juran (6-3, 215), OT Steve Lloyd (6-0, 220) and OT Al Kessel (6-2, 240). Line depth is a strength. Senior Ron Auzenne (6-3, 230) is a transfer from Phoenix Union who doubles at TE-LB. The defense will need to click on all cylinders early in September. The Bruins open with St. Mary's on the road. Last fall they became the first Phoenix Division team west of Central Avenue to win the AAA championship since West High turned the trick in 1957.

TUCSON SUNNYSIDE . . . The Blue Devils will have a new look this fall. Former mentor Paul Petty is now the head coach at Las Cruces,

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NM, and assistant Terry Seward takes over. He's all smiles, too. The Devils return 25 lettermen from a topnotch 9-2 outfit which fell to Salpointe in the first round of the playoffs. Perhaps a coach in Arizona has never left a team with such potential to go to another school as Petty has. Two blue-chip players with lots of talent include halfback Jerry Beasley (6-3, 210) and tackle John Bracy (6-3, 245). Beasley is a senior, can also play linebacker, and runs 40 yards in 4.6 seconds. Bracy is only a junior, but already is considered a major college prospect after running a 4.9. He goes both ways. Other key performers include WR-DB Shawn Pou (6-2, 185, 4.6), QB Mike Smith (6-1, 185, 4.7), RB-CB Mark Cutright (5-10, 180, 4.7), OC Mike Molina (6-0, 205, 5.0), DT-OT Steve Duarte (6-0, 210, 5.1), RB-NG George Martinez (6-0, 190, 5.0), TE Randy Fink (6-0, 185, 4.9), RD-DB Phil Godoy (5-10, 170, 4.7), RB-CB Albert Hernandez (5-11, 180, 4.6), DB-RB Joe Eckford (6-0, 175, 4.6), DB-WR John Benson (5-11, 170, 4.7), LB-RB David Vega (6-1, 200, 4.8), OG Eddie Federico (6-2, 200, 5.0) and DE Martin Carrizosa (6-3, 225, 5.1). Year-after-year Sunnyside is the most talented club in Tucson. This season is no exception. Watch for the Blue Devils to be the No. 1 seed from the AAA-South.

MESA . . . The team which blitzed state champion Trevor Browne during the regular season is back in force again. Coach Ben Arredondo's club rushed for 2,429 yards and passed for 1,795 last fall. They may do even better in '82. No school in Arizona has won as many games (437) as the Jackrabbits, and this year they may push 450. Last year's JV unit went 7-1 (lost 7-6 to Mt. View) and will fill in the gaps. Arredondo again has a major college prospect in lineman Doug Allred, a 6-2, 225-pound senior tackle. QB David Hill (5-10, 170) should bust the 1,000-yard barrier through the air. He'll have a field day throwing to ends like Jeff Rush (6-0, 175), a speedy senior with 4.7 wheels. Other good catchers include running backs Dan Woods (6-1, 190) and Rick Russell (6-0, 180), both 4.8 sprinters. The Rabbits usually start slow and finish fast. But if they come out strong against Marcos de Niza, Dobson and Westwood, watch out!

6 Central Division last fall and nobody seemed to notice. Against teams from their own conference, Mt. View was 9-0. Their only loss was to St. Mary's of Phoenix — a Skyline Division team. But they were on probation and stayed at home. This fall they



have the green light. Coach Parker has a major college prospect of his own in tackle Keith Moody (6-5, 220), a top-notch defender in the mold of former greats Todd Shell (BYU) and Ron Sowers (ASU). QB Mike Springer (6-0, 170) also returns. Joining Moody at the other tackle slot will be senior Gary Hicok (6-1, 190). Like Toro teams of the past, their running game and stingy defense will be their trademark. Scatback Scott Bosley (5-8, 155) will be the scoring threat, while linebackers Kim Sickmiller (6-0, 190) and Dean Clouse (6-0, 190) add punch to the defense. Winning has become a habit at Mountain View. Last season the varsity lost one game. The sophomore club finished 8-0. The juniors went 7-1. Also, most of this year's seniors were members of a Poston Junior High club in 1979 which posted a 10-0 record and didn't give up a point. They outscored their opponents 306-0.

McCLINTOCK . . . The Chargers used a bunch of diehard juniors to win seven games and earn a playoff trip last fall. After beating Coronado in the Central Division playoffs, McClintock fell to Trevor Browne. This time around Coach Karl Kiefer has the horses to march several steps closer to the championship. Blue-chip tackle Shawn Patterson (6-5, 230) is the biggest Charger in camp; running back Anthony Parker (5-10, 165) is the smallest, but possibly the




TOUCHDOWN — St. Mary's Carlton Campbell scores against Amphi.

quickest. Parker is a junior; Patterson will be college-bound. WR David Donahue (6-2, 170) may be the sleeper in the Central Division. He broke an arm last fall and didn't play a down. Other quality Chargers include DB Dennis Ownes, the fastest (4.6) player on the team, CB Bob Raffone, DT Charles Griffith, and signal callers Rich Solar and Kevin McCrary. Halfback Tom Peck returned a kickoff 99 yards against Chandler last year. Rick Tamburo, son of the ASU athletic director, is a consistent linebacker and was a member of the Chargers' successfull baseball team last spring. The future looks bright for McClintock. Three incoming freshmen to keep an eye on: Kent Kiefer, Arthur Greathouse and Cleveland Colter, Jr. Their daddys were really good . . .

PHOENIX ST. MARY'S . . . "If the Knights don't have a quarterback, the Knights don't win." That's what many St. Mary's boosters have been saying this summer, since they watched allstate QB John Rodriguez (1,800 yards passing) pick up his diploma last May. There may be some truth to the statement. The Knights haven't fared well in past years when the QB slot has been up for grabs. But the Knights usually don't have a QB problem, which might explain why they are so darn tough each year. This season that position is up for grabs, and Coach Pat Farrell and his staff have about three weeks to iron it out. But for the first time in years they may succeed by running on every down. The Knights have their biggest line in years. Running backs like speedy Carlton Campbell (5-7, 150, 4.6) will have tackles like Nick Longo (6-0, 215) and Tom Hudson (6-1, 185) blocking up front. Another good blocker is Chris Buford (6-2, 180), a gifted receiver who also plays in the secondary. Senior Kas Bilinski (6-1, 195) lines up at TE, is the "best hitter on the team" when he plays LB, and is also an honor student. Little Joe Ortiz (5-10, 150) is one of the best place kickers in the Skyline Division. Another honor student is FB Darren Chapman (6-1, 205), the biggest to play that position since all-stater Tim Smith (5-10, 205) in 1967. But if the Knights are to knock off Moon Valley, Trevor Browne or Mountain View (they play all three during regular season), Farrell must find a consistent signal caller to fill John Rodriguez's shoes. It won't be easy.

TUCSON AMPHITHEATER . . . This could be an interesting season for the Panthers. Usually a powerhouse, only 17 squad members return from last year's near-perfect 10-2 club. Size and speed appear to be missing. Unlike Amphi teams of the past, this year's outfit may have to rely upon guts and tradition. Not that Vern Friedli's teams of the past had no guts. Their won-loss record during the past decade is one of the best in the state. Last year's varsity "dropped the ball too much." Last year's JV unit dropped off to 3-3-2. Not much help is arriving. But Friedli has two blue-chip players in halfback Ken Jasey (6-0, 185) and DT Jan Price (6-1, 210). They are typical Amphi football players good and tough. Jasey runs 40 yards in 4.6, Price 4.8. Senior QB Kevin Boyle (5-10, 175) is also quick (4.6) and will run the Panthers' option. Tackle Jeff Obedin (6-2, 200) will join Price in the trenches, while WR George Whiteman (6-2, 185) will also double at FS. Amphi's only loss last fall was to Sabino. They were 10-1 before falling to St. Mary's in the quarterfinals.

PHOENIX GREENWAY . . . Teams in the Skyline Division don't have Greenway to kick around anymore. Last year the Demons ended regular season play with a 7-3 record, best in the school's history. They fell to Brophy Prep in a Colorado playoff. "We waited many, many years to have a successful season," said Mike Danielek. "We will try our best to repeat that success. Our staff has worked hard." If the players work as hard as the coaching staff, Greenway will be in the playoffs for sure. Each play starts with the center-snap, and Greenway has a good one in John Boule, a 6-0, 236-pound senior who doubles at DT. Joining Boule in the trenches will be a TE-DT Michael Carroll (6-2, 216), another Demon with high grades. Greenway's "money man" will be John Gillespie (6-1,

187), a WR with 4.8 speed and major college hands. He also roams the secondary. The fastest Demon in camp is QB Frank Stegemier (5-11, 163), another DB with 4.6 speed. He's the team's safety.

FLOWING WELLS . . . The top school in the Class AA ranks is Flowing Wells from Tucson. The Caballeros, coached by Larry Gray, finished 8-2 last fall and return 20 lettermen. Two of those returnees are named Ken Leikem and Mike Effing. They may be the best pitch-and-catch team in the state - all classes combined. Both have received preseason All-America recognition. So far QB Leikem (6-4, 200) has passed for 2,501 yards: 695 as a soph and 1,806 in '81. WR Effing (6-2, 175) may be the best at that position in Arizona. With 4.6 speed he managed to grab 50 passes in 1980, and 50 in '81. He has accounted for 1,578 yards, 843 last year. But there are more weapons at Flowing Wells. The 'Cabs also have the biggest receiver in Tucson in TE Ron Collins (6-4, 220). The college scouts are looking at him also. Senior Kevin Jones (6-0, 175) clocks a 4.7 forty and is the team's running threat. Bill Moore (6-0, 185) lines up at LB and along with FS David Nelson (5-8, 150) is a defensive leader. Quality linemen include OG Brad Parker (5-11, 175), DE Eddie Wells (5-11, 170), OT John Hughes (6-0, 220) and OT Mario Pina (5-10, 190). All except Hughes are seniors.

12 SUNNYSLOPE . . . The Vikings return more holdovers (26) than any team in the Skyline except for Deer Valley. Coach Bill Kee's vets

could give Moon Valley and St. Mary's a run for it. The Vikings went 6-4 in '81 and battled everybody tough. Sixteen starters are back, including QB Mike Evans (5-10, 170), who had a 77-yard TD dash against St. Mary's. He's a three-year starter with 4.7 speed. Besides Evans, Kee is counting on TB Scott DeSeelhorst (5-9, 165), FB Bill Tsakiris (5-10, 180) and TE Mike Chevalier (6-0, 180). Tsakiris is one of the quickest (4.6) and strongest (335 bench, 430 squat) players in the Skyline Division. But the top prospect at Sunnyslope may be junior LB Tim Hicks (6-5, 210), a double threat at tight end.

PHOENIX ALHAMBRA . . . Second-year 13 coach Paul Hoffland is optomistic. He returns 13 starters from a 3-7 club, and insists this year's Lions "could be one of the best in several years." Last year Hoffland watched his young club play almost everybody tough. Alhambra has three major college prospects in the lineup and that is the reason for such optomism: RB-DB Paul Brandon (6-3, 190), RB-DB Tracy Pierce (5-11, 178), and OT-DT Greg Hernandez (6-4, 230). Last spring Brandon ran the 300 IM hurdles in 38.9 seconds. Pierce was the Class AAA high hurdle champ for the second year in a row (14.3). Hernandez will anchor the Lions' front wall. Hoffland thinks both he and the wall will be "much improved in all phases of the game." And like most schools in the Phoenix Union School System, transfers from closed schools like East and Phoenix Union will play a big role. The Lions should roar.

Corte moves in from nearby Scottsdale HS to take over for the Dons. Former head Tom Dahl is now in the college ranks at (nearby) Scottsdale CC. Dahl left behind 20 holdovers from an excellent 8-3 club which fell to McClintock in the Central Division playoffs. They were 5-0 in league play. Cream of the crop is QB Drew Siler, the gifted third-baseman on the Dons' championship baseball team, bothered by hand injuries last fall but ready to go in '82. Siler rushed for 300 yards and passed for 900 despite torn ligaments in his throwing hand. Three top-notch linemen include OT Jon Petruzzi (6-1, 205), DT Tim Gordon (5-8, 210) and OG Vic Hickman (5-10, 185). The Dons got a bonus when Joe Dorame (5-9, 180) moved over from Phoenix St. Mary's. They should be the best team in Scottsdale.

PARADISE VALLEY HORIZON . . . Two years ago the "new kid on the block" finished 1-9 in football. After 10 regular season games

last fall the Huskies were 9-1 and off to the playoffs. The complete turnaround earned Richard Gray coach-of-theyear honors. Horizon beat Phoenix Central in the playoffs before falling to Mesa, finishing 10-2 in its second year of existence. Gray and Co. move from the Phoenix Metro to the tough Skyline, where enemy defenders will have to find a way to stop running back Ray Green (6-0, 190). Horizon's biggest weapon rushed for 1,000 yards (5.4 average), scored 96 points (2nd in AAA), 16 touchdowns and caught 14 passes last year. He's also good on defense, where some coaches fear him the most. His blitzing tactics have done a lot of damage. Another college prospect may be tackle Lee Anderson (6-3, 205), an allleague winner as a junior. Anderson and teammate John Collins (6-2, 225) give Horizon two excellent tackles. There's more: WR-DB Mark Trafton (6-0, 170), SE Gary Callahan (6-0, 160), DB Mark Doughty (6-1, 160) and DE Rob Conrad (6-2, 188), to name a few.


AGUA FRIA . . . Located in Avondale, Agua Fria HS once ruled football in its neck of the woods. But hard times arrived when the Owls entered the AAA ranks, and most opponents sketched in AF as a "sure win" on their schedule. But things are back to normal. Coach Pat Lavin took over two years ago and the Owls are again a contender. Lavin in 79-18-2 in the prep ranks. Most of those wins came at Phoenix St. Mary's. His Owls were 8-2 in '81, missing the playoffs by an eyelash. They may reach that goal in '82. QB Shawn Gilbert (5-8, 165) looks like a Pop Warner player and throws the ball like a professional. He's a major college baseball prospect at shortstop. Last fall he passed for 600 vards in six games. HB Glenn Rogers (5-9, 170) was a 1,200-yard rusher with 4.7 speed last fall. He'll improve. He rushed for 288 yards in one game, and managed to intercept nine passes on defense in 10 games. FB Vince Lopez (5-9, 165) is also back. He runs 40 yards in 4.8 seconds and rushed for 900 yards while scoring 13 touchdowns. Nacho Cano (5-10, 205) is the team's top lineman. TE Randall McDaniel (6-3, 220) is team's biggest and strongest. The Owls are still small in size and number, and this will show when they face the likes of Trevor Browne in regular season play.

17 last year's 5-4-1 squad was a good one, head coach Moody Jackson believes his '82 Rebels have a better shot at the playoffs than most people think. "We played everybody but Maryvale tough," said the second-year coach, himself a former South standout. "We lost to Trevor Browne by one touchdown." Jackson

is hoping that tackle Arthur Rodriguez (6-1, 205) and halfback Greg Jackson (5-11, 175) will show important team leadership. Last year Jackson beat two teams with his kicking game. Junior Clifford Palmer, a transfer from California, and soph Sandy Sledge will battle for the QB slot. Phoenix Union transfer Carl Marshall (6-3, 170) can play QB, DB or WR. He's also a top-notch basketball player, although most coaches agree his future is football.


TUCSON SABINO . . . First under Ollie Mayfield and now under Larry McKee, O Sabino has always been a threat in the playoff race. Last fall the Sabercats finished 7-3 and just barely missed the title race. Eight starters return. Last year's JV club finished 6-2. "We had a very good season in a very good league," said McKee about last year. "We are optimistic." The 'Cats have several key performers who landed honors last fall, including DB-WR Greg Coppock (6-0, 165), DB-QB Gary Feldman (5-11, 170), DB-WB Steve Strong (5-11, 180) and DE-TE Phil Thornton (6-1, 190). All four can run like Sabercats, too. Senior Tyler Gunn (6-2, 215) should be the strongest Sabino lineman. Other strong holdovers include DB Mark Ribando (5-7, 175), DB Cort St. George (6-0, 185), FB Dan Tonz (6-2, 190) and DT Dan Whitfield (5-11, 200). Feldman will or should be the complete OB, able to run, pitch or throw, in addition to punting the ball.

TUCSON SAHUARO . . . Coach Virg Stan will build his 1982 edition of Cougar football around four key players: QB Rodney Peete (6-2, 180), tackle Scott Stone (6-4, 220), guard Brian Bingold (6-2, 210) and kicker Darrin Fila (5-11, 150). Peete is the top player. A junior with 4.5 speed, he may be the best all-around athlete in the state. Last year he was honorable mention all-state as a WR, started at guard on the Cougars' state championship basketball team, and played in the outfield for their state championship baseball team. In fact, he pitched in the state title game against Brophy. Peete played nine games at WR last fall. He scored 11 touchdowns, punted 36 times for a 34.9 average, had a 19.0 punt return average and carried the ball 21 times for a 9.0 average. His father Willie was an all-state player at Mesa High in 1955. In Scott Stone, Sahuaro has another major college prospect who also doubles at defensive end. Brian Bingold also plays nose guard. Darrin Fila was an honorable mention all-city kicker.


